### Grade 8 Narrative Essay Example: "First Chair"

*[The title is short but meaningful. "First Chair" immediately connects to the main goal of the story. In narrative essays, titles often hint at the central experience, challenge, or lesson.]*

I practiced the audition piece for six weeks and then forgot the first eight bars the moment I sat down in front of the panel.

So, I practiced. Every day from 4 to 5:30. My scales were clean. My bow arm was controlled. My teacher said she thought I had a real shot.

*[Here, the writer shows effort and preparation. Narrative essays often include a build-up before the main event to show the importance of the conflict and the hard work involved.]*

Then I sat down in front of the panel, and the piece evaporated.

*[This short sentence creates dramatic tension. Narrative writing often uses sentence length intentionally short sentences can make important moments feel more powerful.]*

I don't mean I forgot it and had to stop. I mean, the notes came out of my bow in the right order, but from somewhere far away, as if I was watching someone else play. My hands knew what to do. My brain had left the building. I finished the piece, thanked the panel, walked back into the hallway, and stood by the water fountain for two minutes before I was confident my legs would carry me normally.

I kept practicing. I auditioned again in ninth grade. That time, I remembered the piece.

I got first chair. The auditorium didn't go quiet in the way I'd imagined; concert hall silence doesn't work the way you plan for it to. But the practice of working toward something, losing it, and choosing to work toward it again: that part was exactly what I thought it would be.
